ANIMAL AND HUMAN HEALTH AND WELFARE

The health and welfare of animals and humans are closely linked. Living with animals has positive effects on human well-being and quality of life. The health aspect of exercising with animals is important in a society where the negative consequences of a sedentary lifestyle are gaining increased attention. Many people also find a meaningful recreation in dog, cat and horse ownership. Interacting with pets and sport animals has been shown to be beneficial because, among other things, it reduces pulse and blood pressure. Knowledge of the spontaneous diseases of animals is of course important for preventive measures and treatment, but also because comparative aspects increase our understanding of human diseases. For the common health of humans and animals, measures to prevent the spread of infections between humans and animals are also needed.

Farm animals are important to our food supply and laboratory animals play a major role in the development of new drugs. The situation for these animals and their welfare raises ethical issues that affect and engage many of us, as well as being important for food and drug safety. Wild animals are part of our precious natural heritage. In recent years, these animals have helped provide valuable information related to environmental impacts on health.

By investing in research on animal health and welfare, we can create a healthier society!

A UNIFYING FORCE

Animal health and welfare are two key areas at the Swedish University of Agricultural Sciences (SLU) where studies are carried out on the needs, behaviour and functioning of healthy and diseased animals.

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
