




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




IE's training programme

- Certified Interpretive Guide (IE CIG)
- Certified Interpretive Writer (IE CIW)
- Certified Interpretive Planner (IE CIP)
- Module on interpretive hosting
- Module for live interpreters*
- Module on interpretation with children*





Course creators prepare the one-day trainer upgrade and are responsible along with the Training Team for spreading the course within the IE network by multiplying the number of IE trainers for the course

All course TCPs and training material remain open to continuous updating, based on trainers' suggestions



IE's training programme in numbers

- 28 trainers from 12 countries
- 31 courses in 13 countries (2022)
- 33 courses in 15 countries (2023)
- 1 CIT course for 16 trainees (11 countries)
- 11 participants/course (average)
